FEMINIST LITERATURE

Kate Chopin began her career as a Regionalist writer, carefully portraying the landscape and the culture of Louisiana. During the time this story was written, a traditional Victorian marriage was possibly the most significant point in a woman's life. Most women did not have the option not to marry: it was simply a necessity for survival. Because some societies prevented women from making their own living, there was an inescapable dependence upon men's income.



After marrying, her rights, property, and even her identity almost ceased to exist. By law she was under the control of her husband. Not only did the he have almost complete control over her body, since beatings were not considered a crime, their children also belonged to him, as did any property and money that the wife brought into the house. It's evident why many women saw marriage as a form of slavery. The works of Chapin showcase elements of both Realism and Naturalism.

The Story of an Hour was considered controversial during the 1890s because it dealt with a female protagonist who felt liberated by the news of her husband's death. Most of Chopin's stories were considered "improper" for the public to read, and were banned from libraries, as many feminist works of the time were.



LITERARY ELEMENTS

Additionally, Chopin uses a technique known as <u>irony</u>, which refers to a contrast between expectation and reality.



Reversal, is a dramatic change in the direction of events in a drama or narrative, especially a change in the fortunes of the protagonist, or main character.
