CREATION MYTHS DEFINED



A **creation myth** is a supernatural mytho-religious story or explanation that describes the beginnings of humanity, earth, life, and the universe (cosmogony), usually as a deliberate act of "creation" by one or more deities. Creation myths are a prevalent motif around the world. Today we'll see two.

THE OSAGE CREATION ACCOUNT

The Osage Nation developed in the Ohio and Mississippi river valleys around 700 BC. They were known as bold warriors, skilled hunters and preservers of family life. Between 1808 & 1825, treaties with the United States resulted in the cessation of Osage tribal land across Missouri, Arkansas and Oklahoma. The Osage relocated to Indian Territory in Oklahoma, site of present-day Osage County. You'll read their creation story.



Today you'll read about how the Wazha'zhe people, who live in the Sky arrived to Earth with the help of the elk.



THE NAVAJO CREATION MYTH

The first Navajo lived in western Canada some one thousand years ago. Their traditional homeland spans from Arizona through western New Mexico, where the Navajo had houses, planted crops and raised livestock. The Navajo people call themselves Dine', literally meaning "The People." The Dine' speak about their arrival on the earth as a part of their story on the creation.



Today you'll read about how Begochiddy created the fourth and final version of the world that currently exists.





LITERARY ELEMENTS

Chronological Order

Refers to the arrangement of details in order of their occurrence. It is the primary method of organization used in narrative writing.

Origin Myth

A story that explains objects or events in the natural world as resulting from the direct action of some supernatural force or entity, most often a god.
