"Thank You M'am" takes place in Harlem during the 1950s. This New York City Community is mostly populated by blacks. When the author lived here, he witnessed the struggle against poverty, crime, and overcrowding. At the time, 250, 000 people lived within 1 square mile. These conditions led to a particular sub-culture that Hughes documented in many of his writing.



biterary Concepts

Character - a fictional construct. A character is the representation of a person in a narrative or dramatic work of art. You listen to what the characters say to each other — and what they don't to formulate an opinion about them.



Important Details

To not miss important details, readers should develop and apply reading skills such as:

Making Inferences Writers don't always provide direct information about their characters. Mostly, they describe what they are doing or saying. You must make your own inferences (educated guesses) about them.

Making Predictions Guessing what will happen next will help you remain engaged and understand the narrative better.


