Homelessness or houselessness – also known as a state of being unhoused or unsheltered – is the condition of lacking stable, safe, and functional housing. 582,462 individuals are experiencing homelessness in America, an increase of about 2,000 people since the last complete census conducted in 2020.

She has earned several prestigious awards, including the 1992 Pulitzer Prize for her Times column "Public & Private." "I think of a column as having a conversation with a person that it just so happens I can't see," she once said.

The main idea of an essay is similar to the theme or central message of a story or poem. The main idea is the point of the paragraph. It is the most important thought about the topic. To figure out the main idea, ask yourself this question: What is being said about the person, thing, or idea (the topic)?
