

ANALYZINO PLOT & SETTINO


The objective of the next readings will be analyzing plot and setting in a work of fiction.

Today you'll be reading *A Sound of Thunder*, a classic time travel sci-fi short story by Ray Bradbury. Pay close attention to the way plot and setting work to create a gripping tale of technology gone wrong.



RAY BRADBURY

Born in Waukegan, Illinois, Ray Bradbury began writing in 1943. Bradbury published more than thirty books, including novels, children's books, and collections of short stories, poetry, and plays. Bradbury's science fiction stories offer social criticism and warnings against the dangers of uncontrolled technological development.



THE BUTTERFLY EFFECT

This story deal with the concept of the Butterfly Effect which states that "small causes can have larger effects". The best illustration comes from the poem "The Nail".

LITERARY CONCEPTS



is the sequence of events which involves the characters in conflict.

includes the historical moment in time and geographic location in which a story takes place, and provides the main backdrop for a story.

Suspense feeling of excitement or anxiety about what may happen.

- 5. Imagine you are Mr. Travis and you have to write an incident report to your employer. Write a cause-and-effect analysis explaining what lead to the changes in the Present at the end of the story.
- 6. If you submitted this report to your superiors in this "new world", what do you imagine will be their reaction towards you? Why?
